2020 Key Registration Milestones: Key information provided, outlining how the League would monitor player registration and player shortages with ample time to make alternate plans if necessary. Deadlines and required registrations to be announced in coming weeks. Conscious of U18 teams, but teams in all grades in general. Netball to follow similar format, but slightly different dates.

AFL CV Expo – reminder for upcoming 2020 expo on the 23rd February. Encourage all clubs to attend, specifically new members, to receive valuable information and network with other clubs.

AFL CV 2019 Third tier review outcome: Update on trial of a soft cap for 2020 – explained the process of gathering information to determine actual impact of introducing a future player cap in the Under 18 competition provided. Encourage clubs not to stockpile players.

2020 AFL Community Camp – Update provided on the upcoming visit by the Essendon AFL side to the Bendigo region on the 13th and 14th of February.

2020 Season Launch – Monday nights seem problematic, therefore investigate trial of Friday night the week prior for season 2020. Important to bring clubs together, whilst profiling League and gaining valuable media coverage.

Meeting Closed 8.06pm

The year of 2020 was one we will remember given all the challenges the COVID-19 pandemic presented for not only our league but our community and nation. While it was disappointing that we could not have our regular competitions of football and netball, larger forces were at work and our priority was always the safety of our players, officials and spectators. We exhausted all possibilities to enable games to occur and were one of the last leagues in the state to call a close to our season. I would like to thank the club presidents and committees for their tireless work and participation in frequent zoom meetings as we sought to find ways to safely stage games. Although only a few U18 football and 17 and under netball matches were played, the work for clubs this year has been enormous and I hope there has been an opportunity for those who were involved in organising COVID safe trainings, etc to have some down time. We are unsure what the season of 2021 will look like and are planning for several scenarios, using 2020 learnings to inform these plans.

While we have not had finals, best and fairest winners or interleague, the BFNL Board has continued to work on the longer-term direction of the League. We have regularly met with the AFL CV Commission to ensure there is rightful recognition of our needs as a premier league with a very proud history. We continue to advocate on behalf of clubs to ensure there is a visible differentiation between the BFNL and other leagues in our region. We are continually looking for innovations that will improve the standard of competition and profile of the BFNL.

As a Board we continually monitored and considered the different financial environment both the League and BFNL clubs were operating in during this year. We reduced League fees for clubs and cut every possible cost. We were fortunate that our past financial management enabled us to have reserves in place that we could use to get us through this difficult period. We are also conscious that 2021 will definitely have financial challenges for both the League and clubs and will be seeking to enact the same sound financial management.

Although every year I thank our League Manager Cameron Tomlins, this year Cameron's work has

been especially tireless and exemplary. Although on reduced workdays, Cameron maintained an excellent service to clubs as well as our sponsors. His work in looking for various ways to promote our valued partners has not gone unnoticed. I would also like to thank all of our business and media partners for their support during these challenging times. Many thanks to our league naming rights partner, the Bendigo Bank for their long standing support of our league. Their support of grassroots football is much appreciated as well. Thanks also to Bendigo Mazda for their ongoing support of netball, Workforce XS, Harmac Homes, the Bendigo Club, Bart 'n' Print, AFS, SportsPower Bendigo, Coffee Storm, Cleanaway, Bendigo Party Hire, High St X-Ray, Great Ideas Awards and Gifts and Red Onion Creative for their valued support this year. We are fortunate to enjoy a close relationship with our media partners (Bendigo Advertiser, Fresh FM, WIN TV, Nine News) who assist in promoting our league and clubs.

This year has seen a changing of the landscape regarding administration of regional football and netball. We are fortunate to have a financially stable and well organised Regional Administration Centre (Hub) which has supported not only this league but all activity in our region during this year. Our thanks to the CV AFL team lead by Carol Cathcart who have gone above and beyond this year. Thanks for Laura Naughton, Norm Sheahan, Jan Mannes, Nathan Williams, Daniel Reid, Jake McLean and Amy Kenyon for all their work this year.

Finally, I would like to thank all the BFNL Board Directors for their tireless commitment and considerable time this year. We are extremely fortunate the range of skills and experience across our Board. In particular I would like to thank Barry Secombe who is standing down after a considerable amount of time on the Board and also Peter Davey who has not renominated. We look forward to a better 2021 where hopefully we will have vibrant competitions of football and netball, and also playing a significant role within our communities.

MISSION STATEMENT

“The Bendigo Football Netball League will provide a professionally administered league which is strong and vibrant. It prides itself on having a major competition status within regional Victoria. The Bendigo Football Netball League legacy is to leave the game and community in better shape for current and future generations.”

Season 2020 presented the Bendigo Football Netball League and local community in general a series of unprecedented challenges due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 global pandemic. A much anticipated season was dealt continuous blow after blow – ultimately resulting in the difficult yet absolute necessary decision to abandon the entire season in the interests of the health and wellbeing of every individual and local community associated with our proud League.

Although many people faced far greater personal challenges as we all dealt with the pandemic on differing personal and professional levels, dedication, unity and resilience are a few words that come to mind when attempting to describe our collective approach to salvaging a 2020 season in a safe, sustainable and achievable manner.

Since mid-March 2020, with final season preparations nearing completion in anticipation of a blockbuster Easter launch, we had to quickly adjust to a new normal of living in a COVID-19 environment – including the postponement of the 2020 BFNL season. What unfolded over the coming months was an incredible test of resilience for players, clubs, volunteers, officials, spectators and members, as the League and clubs worked collaboratively, remained patient, agile and flexible to investigate every opportunity to launch a modified 2020 season if safe to do so.

It is fair to say that the adage of “you don’t know what you’ve got until it is gone” was prevalent, with all participants and members adjusting to the significant void left without local football and netball in our lives throughout the winter months. Further underlining the extraordinary challenges faced, not since 1944 (because of World War 2), has the League faced a scenario where the abandonment of a season needed to be implemented.

Collectively, the League and clubs remained steadfast that together we would leave no stone unturned to provide opportunities for participation for all involved in 2020. However, all decisions were made with understanding that the seriousness of the situation faced meant that any risk, no matter how minor, was not worth taking when considering with the health and wellbeing of our members.

I commend our League Board and club Presidents for the role they have performed during these challenging times under constant and mounting pressure. The ability of all these individual volunteers to dedicate and apply themselves to attempting to understand and adapt to the ever-evolving situation with the best interests of all at the forefront of the decision making process must be praised. Acutely aware of the physical, mental, social, and financial benefits of salvaging a competition in a modified form for the League,

clubs and participants, their dedication, application, and passion should be applauded.

We are incredibly grateful we were able to offer a return to community sport in some form this year, albeit brief, and witnessed the enjoyment it brought so many during this difficult period. Given the slightly relaxed restrictions placed on members of the community aged 18 and under, to host a partial Round 1 return in late July for our Under 18 footballers and 17 & Under netballers was a highlight of our season – however regretfully due to several localised COVID-19 positive outbreaks at the time more than half of the participants scheduled to play were unable to do so. Again, risks associated with the health and safety were non-negotiable, and the correct decisions were made to postpone any matches of concern.

We have learned throughout the new era of living in a COVID-19 environment, that the situation changes by the hour, so although we felt comfortable that those who missed in Round 1 would still get an opportunity in Round 2 only 7 days later, again the gravity of situation was demonstrated with all competitions state-wide halted as we needed to unite to suppress community virus transmission.

Ultimately, this closed the chapter on the entire 2020 season. But this brief taste of a return clearly demonstrated the appetite of everyone to return to our ovals and courts – and I can confidently say as we look forward with a positive approach to season 2021, to predict this will be the biggest and best ever is an understatement!

As a League, in 2020 with a change to the structure of the AFL Vic Community Championships, we invested significant time and effort in conjunction with the Ballarat FNL to coordinate and reignite our Goldfields Interleague rivalry with several highly anticipated football and netball representative matches planned for early May which would have been a highlight of the season.

Coupled with this, the League were again committed to showcasing the best netball talent in our region by participating in the Netball Victoria Association Championships and a host of other lead up tournaments.

Although we did not get the opportunity to play those matches, I extend our thanks to the Ballarat FNL for their cooperation along with the dedication of our committed coaches who were well down the line with match day preparations. Thanks to Darryl Wilson (seniors) and Jason Stevens (under 18) for committing to the 2020 representative football program.

Likewise our hard-working netball representative coaches – Nicole Donnellon who was taking the reins of the 17 & Under team for the first time and had already hosted multiple selection trials, and the returning Jayden Cowling who was scheduled to lead our open netballers to 2020 success.

Business and Media Partners

Although we may not have had an opportunity to officially launch in 2020, the continual support of our corporate partners forms the backbone of our League, as we strive to operate sustainable, successful, exciting, and vibrant competitions. The commitment and dedication to support community sport by these companies is amazing and greatly appreciated, and despite the challenges faced in 2020, most are already committed to partnering with the League again in 2021 which is exciting!

The support of our loyal ongoing major sponsor and naming rights partner, the Bendigo Bank is significant to our League and region in general. Having matches filmed and available for download is a great option for those who cannot make the game or would just like to watch every senior match.

Under the current COVID-19 environment including potential future gathering restrictions, our recent trials to offer live streaming services may become more prevalent and essential in the future to keep the football community connected and up to date. We will continue to work with the team at Red Onion to identify and grow our digital offerings and overall access to the League.

The 2020 media coverage of the BFNL season was quite unique – however not short on breaking stories or news. I would like to thank all our media partners who provide exceptional coverage of the league, both football and netball. Thanks to the Bendigo Advertiser, Fresh FM, WIN TV and Nine News who provide quality coverage on a weekly basis. Again, considering recent periods of isolation, communication through different media platforms is critical to the promotion of our League.

I would also like to mention a variety of other individuals for their services to the BFNL, albeit in a reduced capacity in 2020, we hope to see you all involved again in Round 1 2021. To Steve Dilks at SAA Imaging who covers the weekly events of the BFNL one photograph at a time, Nathan Dole for his weekly and insightful football and netball columns for the BFNL and AFL CV, Richard Jones and Will Hogan for their continued in-depth contributions to the match day Records and BFNL website. Not forgetting the friendly team at Bart 'n' Print who efficiently provide the League with all printing requirements annually, meeting continual deadlines under pressure and with minimal fuss.

Summary

In a season like no other, the dedication and tireless efforts of all those associated with the League and all affiliated clubs has still been clearly demonstrated – even if the work required looked a little different. The ability of our club volunteers, committees, players, officials, and supporters to adjust and absorb the additional requirements of following the outlined protocols from the State Government, AFL Victoria and Netball Victoria should not be underestimated.

From new challenges such as training in segregation under strict additional training

protocols, to the appointment of “COVID-safety officers” and the range of changes to match day logistics presented, everyone involved in 2020 must be commended for their cooperation and assistance in salvaging a season and most of all keeping our players active, engaged and connected.

To all BFNL clubs, thank you for your understanding and cooperation during these unprecedented circumstances. To operate a competitive and vibrant league, we rely on the professionalism and standards set by our local clubs. The strain placed on clubs this year was like no other and the way clubs conducted themselves to remain agile and identify different methods of remaining operational and financial must be recognised. So should the efforts of clubs to engage their respective members and sponsors through initiatives such as creative social media usage which was crucial to maintaining financial stability.

I thank all players, officials, supporters, and most of all volunteers for being a part of your club and donating your time and effort to your club. We could not operate without you and your passion that drives your club and the League towards on and off field success. Thank you for the incredible resilience, patience and support you have shown to not only your club, but the League in general.

Credit to everyone involved who experienced extended periods of uncertainty whilst attempting to plan, prepare and remain motivated. Thanks to the City of Greater Bendigo and surrounding Shire Councils for their dedicated cooperation and flexibility, to offer opportunities for the League to be able to launch on short notice if possible was critical to any shortened season return.

A huge congratulations to Carol McKinstry and the BFNL Board, along with all AFL Central Victoria staff members to understand and adapt to the ever-evolving challenges presented by a global pandemic. The application and dedication of all under moments of significant uncertainty and stress should be acknowledged. The year started with great promise.

Essendon visited Bendigo as part of the AFL Community Camp Program. The camp began with a 'Welcome to Country' followed by training at the QEO attended by schools and supporters. Mayor, Marg O'Rourke, then welcomed the team to Bendigo at a Civic Reception. AFL CV Academy players participated in a training session with the players, while AFL CV Region coaches were provided an opportunity to attend a session with the Essendon coaches. The first day finished with a supporters' dinner. The final day of the camp began with a breakfast with the Essendon Leadership Group for our loyal partners, followed by the players visiting many of the partners' businesses including the Bendigo Bank, Champions IGA, Bendigo Club, La Trobe University, Bendigo Community Health and Fosterville Gold Mine. Once again, we brought our AFL Central Victoria clubs together and began the year with our annual Expo. The Expo included presentations on social media and policy updates as well as a netball coaches conference with Sue Hawkins, former Australian player, and England Coach.

The Bendigo Bank have continued to support community football with referrals of new business bringing \$25,000 into our region this

year. We thank the bank for their sponsorship of our leagues and encourage all clubs to promote the referral program.

To maintain engagement, we increased our social media presence during the year. Whether it was selecting fan teams, playing previous grand finals, or developing flashback videos, we aimed to keep our community connected and engaged.

Thanks to the State Government for their support of Clubs and Leagues through the Community Sport Sector Short Term Survival grants and the Commission through the business support grants.

Congratulations to all concerned in both State and Local Governments and all clubs for driving facility development within the region.

The following developments have been completed:

- Birchip Watchem oval resurfacing
- Eaglehawk have new lights and spectators' shelter
- Ewing Park oval upgrade
- Kangaroo Flat have new netball courts

The Birchip Watchem Netball Club will have two courts converted into acrylic surfaces as part of the Local Sports Infrastructure Fund – Female Friendly Facilities Program.

Thanks to the funding boost from the Victorian Government's Community Sports Infrastructure

Stimulus Program the following projects received funding:

- The Wycheproof Recreation Reserve project – which will include the installation of lighting for the oval, tennis courts and hockey pitch.
- The Charlton Park Oval project which will see installation of lighting for the hockey pitch, tennis courts and oval.

Thanks to WorkSafe who continue to support country football. From grants received in 2019, in 2020 Mt Pleasant unveiled their new electronic scoreboard in the BJFL COVID-19 Competition U/18 match versus Marong and Bears Lagoon Serpentine have behind the goal netting installed and ready to go. Bridgewater received a grant in 2020 from the WorkSafe Club Safety Fund for installation of security lighting.

In 2020 Eaglehawk and Woorinen were both successful in receiving a grant to provide their female footballers with jumpers through the Toyota Good for Footy Gear Grants Program.

South Bendigo and Strathfieldsaye both received a grant through the AFL Victoria Energy Safe funding to purchase new equipment to improve the safety of their canteens.

South Bendigo also won the TAC prize for our region with the most respondents to the survey conducted by the TAC.

Prior to COVID-19, our Development Managers, Daniel Reid and Jake McLean, worked hard to promote our game across the region. They provided many promotional activities, sporting school programs and clinics both in schools and at clubs. Auskick was launched at Eaglehawk with a clinic for 150 students from surrounding schools. The AFL stood down most of their workforce, including the Football Development Managers, from April to October as part of the pandemic.

The academy structures in Bendigo were interrupted but were still able to provide many of our footballers and netballers with development programs. This program is only possible with the support of our volunteer coaches and generous sponsors.

The BUA took the opportunity to mentor boundary umpires into central umpires in U/12 games for the few weeks that the BJFL were able to conduct their competition.

We organised an umpires' education session with the support of Fosterville Goldmine.

AFL Central Victoria believe it has an important role in developing sport administrators/managers and have continued to host students from La Trobe University to support their development and provide industry experience.

Finally, we wish to recognise all staff at the Hub who have supported leagues and clubs through this year. In addition, a big thanks to Amy Kenyon who finished in April after six years with AFL CV for all her efforts to administer our sports, we wish her all the best for the future.

Thank you once again for your contribution to the game through this difficult year and your continued support of the Central Victoria Australian Football Commission. We look forward to working with you to meet the challenges ahead and hope for a better 2021.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2020**

1 Basis of Preparation

Bendigo Football Netball League Inc. is an association incorporated in Victoria under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

(a) Statement of Compliance

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (AASBs) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

The association has adopted AASB 1053 Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards to prepare Tier 2 general purpose financial statements.

The financial statements are Tier 2 general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements (AASBs) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

The financial statements were authorised for issue on by the members of the committee.

(b) Basis of Measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes.

(c) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The committee evaluates estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

(a) Income Tax

The association is exempt from paying income tax under Section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessments Act 1997 and subsequently has not been charged any income tax expense.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment

All property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost and are depreciated over their useful lives to the association.

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to its estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1 (e) for details of impairment).

The cost of fixed assets constructed by the association includes the cost of materials, direct labour, borrowing costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2020**

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefit associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in the profit or loss during the financial period which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

(c) Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the association commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs, except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss' in which case transactions costs are recognised as expenses in profit or loss immediately.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest method or cost. Fair value represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments and any reduction for impairment, and adjusted for any cumulative amortisation of the difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) over the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying amount with a consequential recognition of an income or expense item in profit or loss.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets are classified at 'fair value through profit or loss' when they are held for trading for the purpose of short term profit taking, where they are not held for hedging purposes, derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying amount being included in profit or loss.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2020**

(ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

(iii) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the association's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

(iv) Available-for-sale investments

Available-for-sale investments are non-derivative financial assets that are either not capable of being classified into other categories of financial assets due to their nature or they are designated as such by management. They comprise investments in the equity of other entities where there is neither a fixed maturity nor fixed or determinable payments.

They are subsequently measured at fair value with any re-measurements other than impairment losses and foreign exchange gains and losses recognised in other comprehensive income. When the financial asset is derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss pertaining to that asset previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified into profit or loss.

Available-for-sale financial assets are classified as non-current assets when they are not expected to be sold within 12 months after the end of the reporting period. All other available-for-sale financial assets are classified as current assets.

(v) Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities other than financial guarantees are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial liability is derecognised.

Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the association assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset has been impaired. A financial asset (or a group of financial assets) is deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events (a 'loss event') having occurred, which has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset(s).

In the case of financial assets carried at amortised cost, loss events may include: indications that the debtors or a group of debtors are experiencing significant financial difficulty, default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; indications that they will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; and changes in arrears or economic conditions that correlate with defaults.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost (including loans and receivables), a separate allowance account is used to reduce the carrying amount of financial assets impaired by credit losses. After having taken all possible measures of recovery, if management establishes that the carrying amount cannot be recovered by any means, at that point the written-off amounts are charged to the allowance account or the carrying amount of impaired financial assets is reduced directly if no impairment amount was previously recognised in the allowance account.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2020**

When the terms of financial assets that would otherwise have been past due or impaired have been renegotiated, the association recognises the impairment for such financial assets by taking into account the original terms as if the terms have not been renegotiated so that the loss events that have occurred are duly considered.

(d) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(e) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(f) Cash And Cash Equivalents

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised on the following basis:

- Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers;
- Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets;
- Revenue from sponsorship is recognised on an accruals basis with regard to the season to which it relates; and
- Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(h) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

(j) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.
